Once the season got underway it was a year in which the Premier Women's team continued their recent growth and development to be crowned both the first round Rebecca Liua'ana Trophy champions and the second round Tia Paasi Memorial Trophy champions. This was an outstanding achievement of strong leadership, management, and teamwork. They made a big impression on the club and were the best attendees at the club rooms throughout the season. Many congratulations to all those involved in the team, your results are something to be very proud of.

The Premier Men's team returned one of the poorer results in the club's history losing the Hardham Cup Final to Petone while elsewhere other teams struggled to reach semifinals this year. Financially the Club could not achieve the same gains we made in 2022, but to invest a significant amount in the future development of young players and achieve a small surplus is still a satisfactory fiscal performance. As we ready ourselves for 2024, the appointment of Sean Horan as Director of Rugby will refresh and reenergise the Club with his extensive club history and professional career in rugby coaching and development. Welcome back Sean.

I sincerely thank all the volunteers and committee members who help our club continue to remain a strong force in Wellington rugby and have made a huge contribution to a positive rugby experience for everyone.

Our committed sponsors and Life Members continue to help us achieve these goals. I would like to acknowledge John Flynn at Coolmoves, Mike Botherway at Higgins Concrete, our back of jersey sponsors and the fabulous Shamrock Club for again providing the club financial security to keep developing and improving our facilities and our people.

CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

Looking back to the start of the year, Marist St. Pats embarked on a successful tour of Sydney with a development squad (under 23) featuring a mix of players with Colts and Premier experience along with five school leavers. The side recorded wins over Sydney University and Northern Suburbs. There was some great rugby played and strong relationships forged off the field. I would like to thank all who supported our fundraising efforts particularly our major sponsors Mahony Horner Lawyers (Tom Mahony), Higgins Concrete, Coolmoves, and the Shamrock Club.

The 2023 season saw our Premier Men finish fifth in the Swindale Shield, amid a number of injuries, to make the first round of the Jubilee Cup playoffs losing 20-25 to eventual winners Oriental Rongotai at Hataitai Park. It was a disappointing end to the season for the team having dropped into the Hardham Cup and losing to Petone in the final. Our Premier Reserve side advanced to the Ed Chaney Cup semi-final after a convincing 47-17 quarter-final victory over a higher ranked Hutt Old Boys Marist but their season ended with a 20-32 loss to Poneke. Our Colts team went down 14-28 in their John E Kelly Memorial Cup quarter-final to eventual winners Oriental Rongotai.

The highlight of the year was the remarkable season for our Premier Women who won the Tia Paasi Memorial Trophy for the first time defeating Petone 36-32 in a thrilling final. The victory capped off a dominant season for the side in which they won 10 of 11 games and collected the triple crown of all Wellington rugby silverware - the Rebecca Liua'ana Trophy, the Tia Paasi Memorial Trophy and the Challenge Cup. Marist St. Pats had 14 players included in the Wellington Pride squad that is by far the biggest representation our club has ever had in the side. Ryan Setefano was named as the assistant coach for the Farah Palmer Cup campaign. Congratulations to our players, coaches and managers. You have created history!

I would like to welcome our new Director of Rugby Sean Horan and thank our Game Development Officer Li'i Alaimoana, who stepped down this year, for his service and contribution. The club would not be able to function if it were not for all of our players, coaches, managers, sponsors and volunteers. Thank you for your continued support.

I would like to wish everyone an enjoyable holiday period with family and friends.

I look forward to seeing you all next season. Let us make 2024 a year to remember!

FINANCIAL REPORT

2023 has been another demanding year at the Marist St. Pats Rugby Club. The Finance Sub-Committee has been working hard to support the club, and there have been several initiatives to help grow and maintain the infrastructure that we have.

In 2023, we had revenue of \$450k and expenses of \$438k compared to \$360k and \$275k, respectively, for the 2022 year – a reflection of the continual build back to a full rugby calendar and related activities following the COVID years. We had additional fundraising, sponsorship, and grants flow to the Club in 2023, which helped with our financial results and supported our Colts trip to Australia.

The Clubrooms continue to be a vital revenue stream for the club; bar sales and Clubroom hires continue to grow on previous years, and we again would like to recognise the great effort by the management team, sponsors, and supporters that continue to support us and keep the clubrooms running constantly.

During the year we received a \$30k grant from New Zealand Rugby as part of the Silver Lake deal that is tagged towards improving the club infrastructure; these

monies will be spent in consultation with the Management Committee and Club members and are currently invested in a Term Deposit.

2023 saw the end of Wellington Rugby Union Community development funding, the Management Committee continues to work through solutions on how the relevant positions at the Club are funded.

Expenses were up this year compared to the previous year. This was due mainly to the Colts Australia Tour, our preseason trip to the annual Spillane Tournament, and raising insurance costs added to our club room costs.

The result for 2023 saw a surplus of \$12k operating profit (before depreciation). The following are key items for the year:

- Trust grant revenue increased by \$12k despite less grant funding being available. The club acknowledges and thanks the Trusts for their significant positive impact.
- Bar sales (\$80k) up \$16k from 2022. Clubroom hire was up also thanks to our regular weekly booking along with continued management of this asset.
- 3. There were several fundraising initiatives, including another successful golf day, a stand-up comedy night, and the return of the quiz night and \$100 Raffle.
- 4. We are incredibly fortunate for the loyal support of The Shamrock Club membership.
- 5. WRFU GDO programme income decreased by \$10k due to the conclusion of the program.
- 6. Club membership subscriptions and donations increased by \$7k. This was primarily due to the increase in playing and non-playing subscriptions.
- 7. Naming rights and jersey sponsorship remain positive across the club.

Finally, I would like to thank Finance Sub-Committee members Matt Buck, Martin Paget, Katrina Bailey, and Melissa Moroney for their hard work throughout the year.

PREMIER MEN

After being a beaten Jubilee Cup semi-finalist in 2022, the goal for the PremierMen's team was to ensure they were once again competing for the holy grail ofWellingtonclubrugbyin2023.

Under the guidance of new head coach, Fa'atonu Fili, and his able assistant coaches, the team entered the Swindale Shield round with confidence thanks to a strong pre-season and a mixture of returning experience and exciting youth.

The team completed the Swindale round with an eight win, four loss, and one draw record, and they qualified 5th for the knockout style Jubilee Cup round. Highlights included wins over Northern United, Oriental Rongotai, Upper Hutt, and old foes Petone. However, heavy losses to Old Boys University and Hutt Old Boys Marist gave the team a true reflection of where they stood in the competition.

The Jubilee Cup round was short and sharp with a 25-20 loss to eventual winners Oriental Rongotai, a performance blighted with turnovers and a heavy penalty count; the team can only look back at what might have been in 2023.

After the loss to Oriental Rongotai, the side still had an opportunity to secure silverware with the Hardham Cup. A quarter-final defeat of a substandard Wellington Rugby Club and a win over cross street rivals Poneke saw us book a spot on finals day versus Petone. The team could not replicate its Swindale Shield victory and went down 31-13 to the Hardham Cup winners in an error-ridden performance.

Although we finished with no silverware, there were some consistent performers, including stalwarts Andrew Wells, James Tuiatua, MVP Ben Tuiatua, and Mick Horan Trophy winner, Curtis Finnigan. Young players Jack O'Brien, Logan Love, Milan Kriletich, and Francis Mettrick provided energy and skill throughout the year and featured in some of the team's 2023 highlights.

Thank you to all the Club sponsors and members for their unwavering support and team management, who worked tirelessly to put the Premier Men on the park to compete each week.

PREMIER RESERVES

The Premier Reserves this season were coached by Pita Taele and Sonny Whitman. John Poutawera and Poto Masina managed the side.

The team kicked off their season against Avalon with a convincing 56-19 win. They had a tough loss on the road to Tawa on Easter Saturday going down by 14-43 after initially leading 14-0. As the club celebrated Old Timers Day, the Prem Reserves bounced back and recorded a big win. The team led Northern United by 59-0 before conceding tries in the final half an hour to record a 59-33 win.

In the Harper Lock Shield, the team earned their third win from four games with a 36-3 win over Johnsonville at Evans Bay Park. Three weeks later on the same ground they scored a late try to break a 29-29 deadlock and beat a previously unbeaten Hutt Old Boys Marist side by 36-29. The side then went on to record wins away from home by beating Oriental-Rongotai by 22-17 and Paremata-Plimmerton by 40-24. The last game of the round saw a close match with Petone which ended with a 21-36 loss after a late try side.

Our side finished fifth and hosted Stokes Valley in the playoffs winning their Ed Chaney Cup elimination match. The following week we travelled to the Hutt Rec to face a higher ranked Hutt Old Boys Marist in the quarter-final and a clinical performance in the pouring rain saw us claim a convincing 47-17 victory.

Our Premier Reserve side played Poneke at Kilbirnie Park in the Ed Chaney Cup semi-final, but the season ended early with a 20-32 semi-final loss.

Thank you to all the players for a memorable season.

COLTS

The 2023 season for the MSP Colts saw exciting growth throughout the team and the competition. While the result was not what we were after, it shows that the club has a future to be excited about. The team consisted of a mix of returning players and new players made up of locals, college leavers, and new talent from outside the Wellington region. Head Coach Li'i Alaimoana completed his final year of coaching with the team and was newly joined by Eric Sione as the Forwards Coach and Theo Gordon as the Team Manager, while Brendan Reidy returned as Resource Coach.

The season started with pre-season games against Petone, in which we lost 22-41, and Wellington, in which we won 55-5. The competition started hot with a convincing 74-0 win over Wainuiomata, with hat-tricks from both Noah Guise and

Malachi Feterika. After retaining the Xavier Reidy Cup against the St. Pats Town 1st XV on ANZAC Day, our first big challenge came against OBU. While the boys played exceptionally well and saw a hat-trick for Dominic Leota-Johnson, OBU ultimately got the better of us, with them narrowly winning 24-22. After our bye week, we took on Norths, which, despite us jumping out to a 26-0 lead, Norths came back strong and won the game 34-31. The next game was a wet, muddy affair against Poneke, which saw us come away with a narrow 14-12 win.

The next three games saw the team hit their stride. After having the lead for most of the game in terrible conditions against the undefeated Petone, they scored a try in the last play of the game to defeat us 16-12. Despite the loss, the boys were motivated, which led to an outstanding performance against Oriental-Rongotai. After conceding a couple of early tries, the boys got back into the game. A lastminute penalty, which would have given us the win, narrowly missed, and the game ended in a 27-all draw. The momentum from the performance against Ories carried into the following week against Upper Hutt. After a scoreless first half, two tries from Troy Gray, including one in the corner right before the final whistle, gave us the 10-7 win.

PREMIER WOMEN

After an historic 2022 season that saw our Premier Women reach the Tia Paasi Memorial Trophy Final for the first time, the coaching group that led them there returned with a notable addition. Long-time head coach Ryan Setefano returned with forward coaches Tovio Apolo and Tui Tuiatua; they were joined by club legend Norm Broughton. Team medics were Luke Donaldson and Kathy McConville. The team manager was Duaan Beer.

Our Premier Women won the Rebecca Liua'ana Trophy (Women's First Round) for the first time in the club's history after beating Northern United, who at that point sat atop the points table, by 38-17 at Porirua Park. The side finished the round with six wins and one loss, with the only defeat coming in the first round to Petone whom they shared the title with.

Our Premier Women kicked off the second round by hosting Petone, however the opening match of round two saw a reversal of fortunes with our side jumping out to a 14-0 lead. They continued to extend this in the second half before a flurry of late Petone tries narrowed the final score to 24-19. The side retained the Challenge Cup (played for like the Ranfurly Shield). The team then racked up a 27-12 win over Oriental-Rongotai at Polo Ground and marched into the final with a nine game winning streak after beating Northern United by 41-20.

Saturday 17 June will go down as a momentous day in the history of Marist St. Pats, after our Premier Women won the Tia Paasi Memorial Trophy by beating Petone 36-32 in a thrilling final played in front of an enthusiastic crowd at NZCIS in Upper Hutt. The game started with a hiss and a roar with Lyric Faleafaga scoring the opening try for Marist St. Pats before Petone struck back soon after. Tries to Sydnee Wilkins and Marcelle Parkes saw the side build momentum before the Villagers narrowed the score line on half-time to 17-12. After half-time oranges our side came out strongly with Georgia Daals scoring consecutive tries early in the second half, she would later be named the player of the match. The sides traded tries again which saw MSP put one hand on the trophy at 36-17 - but this Petone side was never going to rollover. Another Petone try with 10 minutes to go, coupled with a yellow card to MSP, set up a thrilling end to the game with

Petone eventually scoring again with one minute on the clock. Marist St. Pats kept their cool and forced a turnover and, consequently, themselves into the history books. The final was a stunning advertisement for the rise of Women's rugby, both at Marist St. Pats and around New Zealand. The victory capped off a dominant season for the side in which they won 10 of 11 games and collected the triple-crown of all Wellington Women's rugby silverware - the Rebecca Liua'ana Trophy, the Tia Paasi Memorial Trophy and the Challenge Cup.

The Wellington Pride squad for the Farah Palmer Cup included a whopping 14 Marist St. Pats players. This is by far the biggest representation our club has ever had in the representative side. Ryan Setefano was an assistant coach for the side. We acknowledge Ryan, who has led our Marist St. Pats Premier Women since 2016. In his tenure as head coach, he has rebuilt the MSP Women's programme into one of the top performing teams in the grade.

Our Premier Women cleaned up at the club's annual prizegiving following their historic season. Along with Team of the Year honours, Monica Tagoai became the first female player to win the Paul Donoghue Cup for Sportsperson of the Year. The Vice-Captain of the all-conquering Marist St. Pats side was also the Vice-Captain for the Wellington Pride and a feature of the Hurricanes Poua side. Coaches Ryan Setefano and Norm Broughton were awarded the Ah Kuoi Family Cup and Poutawera Whanau Cups respectively.

Congratulations to our players, coaches, and managers on your 2023 season. You have created history!

Statement of Accounting Policies

Marist St Pats RFC For the year ended 30 September 2023

Reporting Entity

These are the financial statements of Marist St Pats RFC. Marist St Pats RFC is an incorporated society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and is engaged in the operations of running an amateur rugby club.

Basis of Preparation

The entity has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

The financial statements have been prepared on an historical cost basis, unless otherwise stated and all figures are presented in New Zealand dollars.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

As a promoter of amateur sport, Marist St Pats RFC is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Receivables

Receivables are stated at their estimated realisable value. Bad debts are written off in the year in which they are identified.

Revenue

Marist St Pats RFC receives revenue in the form of members' subscriptions, sponsorship, grants, donations, fundraising, bar sales and merchandise sales. All revenue is recognised in the period in which it relates to.

Inventory

Inventory is stated at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

Fixed Assets & Depreciation

The entity's classes of fixed assets are detailed in Note 5. All fixed assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated at the maximum rates permitted by the Income Tax Act 2007.

8. Commitments

The Clubrooms are insured for \$1,680,000 building replacement cost. The valuation for insurance purposes was performed in May 2014. The Clubrooms are reported at original cost less accumulated depreciation.

The land on which the Clubrooms are situated is leased from the Wellington City Council. The current lease is for 10 years and expires in 2026.

The Gymnasium is leased from the St Patrick's College Board of Proprietors. A new lease agreement was entered into for 5 years commencing 1 February 2022, expiring 31 January 2027 (subject to renewal). Annual consideration for the license of the Gymnasium totalling \$7,150.00 exclusive of GST is required under the new agreement. This amount includes rates, water, electricity and other services provided to the Gym.

9. Contingent Liabilities and Guarantees

There are no contingent liabilities or guarantees as at 30 September 2022 (Last year - nil).

10. Related Parties

There were no transactions involving related parties during the financial year.

11. Events After the Balance Date

There were no events that have occurred after the balance date that would have a material impact on the Performance Report (Last year - nil).

12. Ability to Continue Operating

The entity will continue to operate for the foreseeable future.
